comment: Improved weather for crop development in the US Mid West, together with a stronger US dollar pressured US prices this past week. Weather north of the border does not appear as altogether favourable for late crop maturity and weaker a Canadian dollar was also probably supportive but Prairie prices were also lower. Heavy rains in southern US Great Plains must be welcome for famers there waiting to plant their winter wheat crop. Grain is being shipped from the Ukraine ports but not at a pre-hostilities pace. Very dry conditions continue to dominate western Europe and concerns over drought are beginning to emerge from China

**NEWS**: The provincial crop reports suggest harvest has started in many areas.

For MB, as of Aug. 16: Harvest of fall seeded crops has started.

For SK, as of Aug. 15: Harvest is 5 percent complete compared to an 8 percent five-year average and 20 percent last year. Cropland topsoil moisture is rated as 60 percent adequate compared to 4 percent last year and a 37 percent four-year average.

## For AB, as of Aug. 16: No report

Most of the Prairies have received close to or above average precipitation since last harvest - light and dark green areas on the map. The exceptions to this are central SK and parts of southern AB. Further it appears to have been unusually dry in the Peace River country over the last couple of months.

The USDA's August 14 based crop progress report placed corn, soyabeans and spring wheat crop conditions at 57, 58 and 64 percent good or excellent, respectively down one, down one percentage points and unchanged from the previous week. The five-year average readings for corn and soybeans were 63 and 62 percent. Seventy-

four percent of the soyabean crop has started pod setting, a few days behind the 5-year average rate for this measure of development. The spring wheat harvest was reported 16 percent complete compared to 55 percent last year and a 35 percent five-year average.

**OPINION:** With the prospect of at best average yields across the Prairies and beginning stocks at pipeline levels, total supplies of crops will be quite modest relative to the marketing system's capacity. With some unusually large crop input invoices to be paid, there may be some haste to get cash flow from new crop supplies. But once this has past, moving supplies will not be a major challenge for grain marketing facilities. But judging by developments elsewhere labour disruptions may be greater than usual challenge.
