COMMENT: Wheat prices were generally lower over the week with improving prospect for the US winter wheat crop. On Friday, lead by spring wheat, all classes were higher but prices are still close to life of contract lows. Canadian wheat prices appear stronger than normal against US prices. Corn prices were slightly lower but soybean prices slightly higher.

Canola prices continued higher as old crop supplies dwindle and for the moment trade policies are not unduly adverse.

NEWS: As is often the case MB was the first Prairie province to report progress.

For MB, as of April 29: Provincial seeding progress was about 3 percent complete slightly ahead of 2 precent last year and a five-year average of 1 percent.

The USDA weekly crop progress report indicated a four percentage point improvement in the good to excellent ratings of their winter wheat crop. At 49 percent good or excellent the rating is on a par with a year ago and 8 points above the average rating for the last five years.

Progress with planting of US spring crops was placed at 24, 18 and 30 percent complete for corn, soybeans and spring wheat, respectively, about on a par with year ago levels of 25, 17 and 31 and slightly ahead of five-year averages of 22 and 12 percent for corn and soybeans but well ahead for spring wheat.

Canadian Grain Commission data indicate a tightening of commercial supplies as export and domestic movement have exceeded the seasonal decline in farmers' marketing. Total commercial supplies have decline 11 percent since mid March but are still 13 percent above levels of a year ago.

Country elevator stocks upon which grain companies can draw on to meet nearby export and domestic sales, have declined by 20 percent but are 12 percent above year earlier levels. The decline in wheat stocks has been rather greater than this but that for canola rather less.

Statistics Canada's March 2025 crop stocks report will be published this coming Thursday, May 8.
