**COMMENT:** Wheat prices were narrowly mixed over the week with some positive demand news off set by further increases in global output. Corn and soybean prices were lower with US/China negotiation yet to produce anything positive for agricultural trade and US biodiesel program details still unclear. Canola prices were lower in advance of the main harvest.

**NEWS**: **Prairie provincial crop reports** indicate better harvest progress towards the west but at the expense of declining soil moisture.

For MB, as of Sept 16: Harvest completion sits at 50 percent, up from 40 percent last week.

**For SK, as of Sept 15**: Rainfall in many areas briefly paused harvest which advanced to 53 percent complete up from 41 last week and a 73 five-year average. Topsoil moisture stands at 66 percent adequate compared to 41 last year.

For AB, as of Sept 16: With little or no rain in recent weeks harvest has reached 59 percent complete up from 39 last week and ahead of a five-year average of 52. The good to excellent surface moisture rating has declined to 29 percent, below a 5-year average of 43 and subsurface moisture to 31 percent below a 38, 5-year rating.

Stats Can/Ag Can's August 31 estimate of crop production indicate limited adjustment to conditions at their July estimate.


Output is expected to be 2 percent higher than the July estimate for the 14 crops estimated. Total output of 14 major crops is estimated at 94.9 million tonnes compared to 93.0 last year. Spring wheat, durum, barley, soybeans, lentils and flaxseed estimates were higher.

The **USDA** reported crop conditions, as of September 14, for the maturing corn and soybean crops both down one percentage point but still comfortably above 5-year average readings. The corn and soybean crops were assessed 4 and 5 percent harvested, compared with 5-year averages of 7 and 3, respectively. The winter wheat crop was 11 percent planted up from 5 percent last week and compared to a 13 percent 5-year average.

With harvest at about half done crop movements have picked up from the supply limited rates of a month ago. **Canadian Grain Commission (CGC)** data indicate that over two million tonnes of crops were delivered by producers during the week ending September 14, the largest in a single week in at least 10 years and possibly an all-time record. Movement from primary and processed elevators of crops and products for the week reached almost 1.5 million tonnes. Exports from CGC licensed facilities totaled 0.87 million tonnes about twice what had been possible during previous weeks with limited supplies.

**OPINION**: If the adjustments in the model-based estimates of output between July 31 and August 31 reflect crop conditions in August, then the rather exceptional conditions in September will result in adjustments in the November survey estimate.

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
